EGRIP camp activities:

During the period from Monday to Thursday the main focus of camp was to handle 109th flights bringing crew members, cargo and fuel to camp. The main crew exchange happened with Skier 11 on Monday 13th June when 8 people left camp and 18 people arrived (including two 109th airdrop observers). Two pallets of retro cargo were also flown out by the Skier. Tuesday Skier 21 performed a successful airdrop of 32 barrels of drill liquid just north of the Skiway, but brought less fuel to camp than expected. Hence it was necessary to call in a total of 3 Skiers Wednesday and Thursday to make sure camp has enough fuel for all the activities planned during the coming 5 weeks. All 3 missions successfully delivered fuel to camp: Skier 31: 11609 liters, Skier 41: 9600 liters (in drums), Skier 42: 12080 liters. Skier 42 also delivered 1 pallet of science equipment and 1 PAX to camp, and it left with 1 Pallet of retro cargo as well as 1 PAX from camp. During the intensive flight period the skiway was groomed in tune with the pilot advice, resulting in an upgrade of the skiway. Monday and Thursday the Basler made its two last radar flights of this season and Friday it left for SFJ for reconfiguration in anticipation of the TUNU pull out.

During the first days of the week, the new ramp to the drill trench was successfully covered by a snow roof cast using the big green balloon. This new covered ramp as well as an increase in camp personnel facilitated a significant acceleration of the excavation work in the drill trench. This work was ongoing all week with snow blocks being cut and carried to a Flexmobile pulled sledge that carried the blocks up the new ramp. Excavation work was still ongoing at the end of the week and is expected to last many more days.

Drilling:

No drilling is scheduled before late June.

Science:

Monday and Thursday the Basler made its two last radar flights of this season, while the drone team managed a total of 14 drone flights during the week. On the surface various science teams got organized and make progress on ApRES measurements (5 stations were placed out of camp), assembly tests and troubleshooting of the EGRIP radar system and the Greenland Exploration Rover. Furthermore, the AWI shallow drill system was setup south of camp and is now ready for drilling the S8 shallow core. Snow sampling was also carried out during precipitation events in the weekend.

EGRIP Camp Population: 28

Weather at EGRIP:

Mainly sunny weather with southerly and southwesterly wind 5-15kt Monday to Thursday, turning more cloudy Friday and during the weekend as winds turned first SE and then N increasing up to 17kt.

Temperatures between -21°C and -6°C with an increasing trend for night-time temperatures as clouds started to dominate.

Kangerlussuaq activities:

The FOMs were busy with a big crew exchange Monday, but was good prepared. The fuel situation in camp kept the FOMs active for a few days arranging three extra missions with the 109th getting fuel level up in camp and enough for keeping the camp running until next scheduled mission on July 19th. Wednesday the AWI ship container was received, where equipment for the radar and flight equipment are stored. Friday the Polar 5 plane came back to town and the radar system will be re-equipped for logistics missions next week. The first positive covid-19 case in the EGRIP project showed up in the weekend of a field participant that left EGRIP 5 days earlier. The situation was taken care of and our goal is not to get covid into camp. Finally, all the ID cards for the cars were permitted. There has been a change in the FOM crew, so we had to say goodbye to Helene, Eliza & Sune and welcome to Eirini and Thomas.

Weather in Kangerlussuaq/SFJ:

Weather started out with snowy weather for Monday and Tuesday, reducing the mosquitoes' activities. Wednesday temperature raised and the same did the level of mosquitoes, especially worse during handling fuel drums. Friday quite windy with sand storms in town. From end of Friday rainy/cloudy weather, again reducing the mosquitoes level. Temperatures between -2°C and +12°C.
